The Body and Blood of Christ (Corpus Christi)

This Sunday we celebrate one of the greatest feasts in the calendar of the Catholic Church, the Feast of the Body and Blood of Christ, known to many of us as Corpus Christi.

Through this Feast we celebrate in awe, wonder and thanksgiving, the Real Presence of the Body and Blood, Soul, and Divinity of Jesus Christ in the Eucharist.

The Feast has been celebrated in the universal Church since 1264 during the papacy of Pope Urban IV. For many of us the Feast of the Body and Blood of Christ, Corpus Christi, will bring back vivid and happy memories of First Holy Communion, processions of the Blessed Sacrament and Benediction.

However, this year the Feast will be celebrated in a strange and challenging way. For the doors of our churches remain locked and closed. There are no public Masses where the faithful can be fed and nourished through Holy Communion, the real and true presence of Jesus Christ.

So many of us will experience the Feast with an acute sense of longing, mourning and hunger for the Eucharist, for the Blessed Sacrament.

As a priest I have the immense privilege of still being able to celebrate the Mass, still being able to be fed and nourished by the Eucharist in an empty and silent church.

I too feel an acute sense of longing, mourning and hunger for my people, my community that I serve and I love. I am a shepherd without his flock and it hurts!

Of course, the absence of the Mass has not destroyed the Church, our Catholic communities and parishes. Many Catholics have found new ways of practising and witnessing to their faith. Many have grown and found nourishment outside of the celebration of the Mass.

Indeed one woman said in a catholic magazine that after the lockdown she may not want to return to the Mass and spend her time "watching other people (mainly men) doing rituals when I can be participating and challenging myself to grow through prayer and study...."

Quite frankly I was amazed by this attitude. I accept that this person and indeed some Catholics have issues and disagreements with the Church. But surely none of us have issues and disagreements with Jesus Christ.

And as the Feast of the Body and Blood proclaims loud and clear at every celebration of the Mass we receive the real and true presence of Our Lord Jesus Christ.

As St Peter Julian Eymer said: "The Eucharist is the supreme proof of the love of Jesus. After this, there is nothing more but Heaven itself."

Why would any Catholic freely choose to be absent from the Mass and deny themselves of this wonderful and supreme gift, the gift of Jesus Himself.

For we as Catholics are a Eucharist people and the Mass, the Eucharist is the glue that holds us together, that unites us as the Universal Church founded by Jesus Our Lord. The Mass, the Eucharist, Holy Communion is the shining and bright jewel in the crown of our Catholic faith.

One of the saints said these challenging words: "A person who fails to love the Mass fails to love Christ."

It seems to me that the woman from the catholic magazine got it wrong. For the Mass, the Eucharist is not something we come to watch, no it is something we come to do. We gather as the people of God, as a community to do something together. In the celebration of the Mass we share and keep holy the memory of Jesus. We share the Eucharist, the body and blood of Our Lord.

Through the Mass, through the Eucharist we strengthen our faith and we strengthen each other and we become the body of Christ to others.

No, the Mass is not about passively watching, it is about sharing, it is about being a community united and as one through the Eucharist.

Through the Mass, through the Eucharist we experience and receive Jesus in the form of bread and wine. Then we leave our churches and, inspired by our reception of Jesus in Holy Communion, we see the same Lord in the form of the hungry, the poor and the suffering. And as we are called to honour the Blessed Sacrament we are called to honour them.

St. Maximilian Kolbe, who died in a Nazi concentration camp said these words: "If angels could be jealous of human beings, they would be so for one reason: Holy Communion."

So, as we celebrate the Feast of the Body and Blood of Christ it is with a sense of longing and yearning for the days when our churches will be open for the celebration of the Holy Mass.

Of course, we continue to be the Church and a parish without the celebration of the public Masses. We remain and will always remain an Eucharistic People.

But the Mass, the Eucharist is essential for us as a church, as a parish community and as individuals created in the image of God. As Christians, as Catholics, the Mass, the Eucharist is not only the centrepiece of our worship, it is the centrepiece of our whole existence.

We cannot be truly content, satisfied and even happy being deprived of the celebration of the Mass.

For as Pope Benedict has written: "The happiness you have a right to enjoy has a name and a face: it is Jesus of Nazareth, hidden in the Eucharist."

Oh Happy Day when we will all be together to celebrate the Mass, to celebrate the Eucharist and to receive the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ once again.

This Sunday we celebrate the Feast of The Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ, known to many as Corpus Christi. This celebration has its origin in the Diocese of Liege in 1246 and was known as Corpus Christi. In the reforms of Vatican II, Corpus Christi was joined with the Feast of the Precious Blood, celebrated on 1st July, to become the Solemnity of the Body and Blood. Through this Feast we celebrate Christ's gift to us through the Eucharist, the source and summit of our life together as the Church.

The Church teaches that in the Eucharist we experience the Real Presence of the Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity of Jesus Christ. Of course, it is with a great sense of sadness and loss that we cannot mark this great Feast with the celebration of the Mass because of the current restrictions.

However, better days are on their way and from Monday we will be opening our churches for a limited period. From 15th June St Mary's Falmouth will be open for private prayer only from 10 am to 12 noon on Mondays and Wednesdays. St Mary's Helston will be open on Tuesdays and Thursdays again from 10 am to 12 noon.

My sincere thanks to all those who have worked so hard to prepare for the churches at Falmouth and Helston to open and to those who have volunteered to be stewards and cleaners.

We all pray that we will soon be able to celebrate once more the Holy Mass together.
